Dear Congressmen Smith, Davis Cuellar, Davis, and Congresswoman DelBene,


On behalf of the National Association of College and University Business Officers (NACUBO), I write to express support for your recently introduced legislation, H.R. 4135.

As you know, helping employers attract the best possible employees and build a skilled workforce is a critical part of strengthening the U.S. economy and helping our country to maintain its role as an economic world leader. The provisions contained in Section 127 of the U.S. tax code play a significant role in these efforts and support U.S. competitiveness.

Since its original enactment in 1978, Section 127 has aided non-traditional students by allowing employers to offer employees up to \$5,250 annually in non-taxable tuition assistance, but unfortunately that benefit amount has not increased in almost 40 years. Your legislation takes much needed steps to correct this oversight which has steadily eroded the value of the Section 127 exclusion over the past four decades. Additionally, building automatic inflation adjustments ensures that the benefit will continue to support the U.S. workforce for years to come without requiring legislative red tape to constantly reinvigorate the credit's usefulness.

NACUBO applauds your effort to support both non-traditional students and their employers by crafting legislation which recognizes that higher education can take many forms, all of which aids in building a stronger and more successful American populace.
